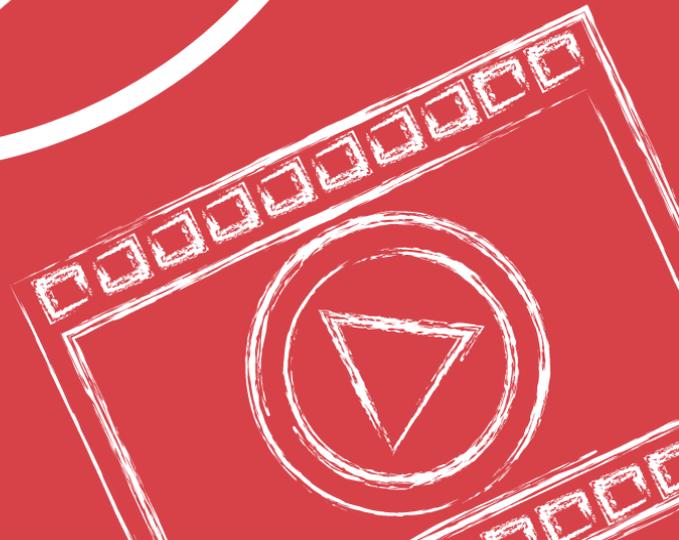

REMOTE LEARNING INFORMATION FOR PARENTS



Remote education provision: information for parents

This information is intended to provide clarity and transparency to pupils and parents or carers about what to expect from remote education if local restrictions require entire cohorts (or bubbles) to remain at home.

The remote curriculum: what is taught to pupils at home

A pupil's first day or two of being educated remotely might look different from our standard approach, while we take all necessary actions to prepare for a longer period of remote teaching.

What should my child expect from immediate remote education in the first day or two of pupils being sent home?

This term, in order to be able to deliver remote learning, we have purchased an online learning platform, called Showbie. All children will now have had the opportunity to use Showbie in school, and most will have used it for homework, so the children should be familiar with how to use it. From the first day of absence, teachers will post work assignments on Showbie and will use the platform to communicate with pupils.

For those children who do not have access to a tablet, desktop computer, or laptop, printed off work (or workbooks) will be available from the office.

Reception and pre-school staff will use Tapestry to communicate with parents and facilitate remote learning.

Following the first few days of remote education, will my child be taught broadly the same curriculum as they would if they were in school?

- We teach the same curriculum remotely as we do in school wherever possible and appropriate. However, we have needed to make some adaptations in some subjects. For example where specific equipment may not be available at home, and in order for pupils to be able to work on their own, rather than in a pair, group or team, such as in PE, music, art and design, design technology, computing and science.

Remote teaching and study time each day

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

We expect that remote education (including remote teaching and independent work) will take pupils broadly the following number of hours each day:

Years R - 3	3 hours 20 minutes
Years 4 – 6	5 hours

Accessing remote education

How will my child access any online remote education you are providing?

Reception class will access their remote learning via Tapestry. The rest of the school will access their learning via Showbie. Paper copies/workbooks will be available for those without access to IT.

If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils may not have suitable online access at home. We take the following approaches to support those pupils to access remote education:

- In the event of a bubble closure school has been allocated 2 ipads to lend to disadvantaged pupils to use at home. These can be accessed by contacting the school office.
- Pupils can access any printed materials needed if they do not have online access, by contacting their class teacher, or the school office.
- Pupils can submit work to their teachers, if they do not have online access, by returning it to school, or by email.

How will my child be taught remotely?

We use a combination of the following approaches to teach pupils remotely:

Some examples of remote teaching approaches:

- Uploaded teaching materials and activities on Showbie/Tapestry, with live feedback and marking
- recorded teaching (e.g. Oak National Academy lessons, White Rose Hub videos, video/audio recordings made by teachers)
- printed paper packs produced by teachers (e.g. workbooks, worksheets)
- textbooks and reading books pupils have at home
- commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences
- long-term project work and/or internet research activities

Engagement and feedback

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

How will you assess my child's work and progress?

Our approach to feeding back on pupil work is as follows:

Additional support for pupils with particular needs

How will you work with me to help my child who needs additional support from adults at home to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils, for example some pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may place on families, and we will work with parents and carers to support those pupils in the following ways:

Remote education for self-isolating pupils

Where individual pupils need to self-isolate but the majority of their peer group remains in school, how remote education is provided will likely differ from the approach for whole groups. This is due to the challenges of teaching pupils both at home and in school.

If my child is not in school because they are self-isolating, how will their remote education differ from the approaches described above?

- Staff will upload to Showbie, the lessons and activities that the rest of the class are doing, and will check in with pupils via Showbie chat during the day, to answer queries and provide support. NB this may only be during break times, due to teaching the rest of the class.
